



NEOEA Day: Educator-owned Professional Development

(Wondering why so many kids will have the day off on October 12 this year?)

It could be said that professional development is in NEOEA's organizational DNA. When the principals and superintendents who founded what was then called the "North Eastern Ohio Teachers Association" first met in 1869, their main purposes were to improve education funding, school supervision, and teacher training. One of their earliest decisions was to have an annual meeting on the second Friday of October, where their teachers could attend a wide variety of workshops on critical educational topics.

Membership in the early twentieth century soared so rapidly that the annual meeting occupied three halls. For decades, educators from thirteen counties gathered in downtown Cleveland, until automobiles eclipsed trains as the preferred mode of transportation and parking became a serious obstacle. For decades more, NEOTA experimented with different arrangements of centralization and decentralization, finally settling on "NEOTA Day" as a widely-dispersed system of workshops.

Meanwhile, in the 1960s, control of NEOTA's internal affairs gradually shifted from administrators to classroom teachers, and NEOTA became affiliated with the National Education Association (America's largest teacher union) and its state affiliate, the Ohio Education Association. NEOTA Day survived this change: most local affiliates negotiated contractual requirements that schools give students the day off, which allows teachers and other education employees to use the day to attend professional development activities.

In 1989, as NEOTA's membership became more diverse, the organization changed its name to NEOEA: the North Eastern Ohio Education Association. The familiar NEOTA Day was renamed as NEOEA Day, welcoming other education employees besides preK-12 teachers.

For many educators--members and nonmembers alike--NEOEA Day represents an important option in professional growth. Participants in most programs receive certificates of participation which LPDCs (local professional development committees) count toward license renewals. For most educators, however, the most important aspects of NEOEA Day are variety and choice. Variety comes from the large number of choices: on NEOEA Day 2011, we offered 48 programs of professional, personal, and leadership development. Choice is enhanced by the organization's ownership of the programs: many programs are designed and presented by members themselves, while other programs bring in outside experts.

As NEOEA begins its second 140 years, NEOEA Day remains a unique and important part of educational life in northeastern Ohio.



Fact Sheet

NEOEA is a professional association of educators working to improve public education in northeastern Ohio by serving the needs of its members. Founded in 1869, NEOEA is the largest education organization in northeastern Ohio and one of the oldest education organizations in the United States.

Our 33,000+ members are education employees working at 151 educational institutions in the eleven counties of northeastern Ohio. They are organized into 193 local affiliates which act as exclusive bargaining agents representing staff members at a wide variety of workplaces:

- public school districts;
- county boards of developmental disabilities;
- educational service centers;
- career centers;
- colleges and universities.

Although incorporated as a professional association, NEOEA is affiliated with the National Education Association (America's largest and oldest education union) and its state affiliate, the Ohio Education Association. We share with those organizations a commitment to democratic governance, and NEA, OEA, and NEOEA are all governed by Representative Assemblies consisting of locally-elected delegates. NEOEA's Representative Assembly meets twice each year to conduct the business of the Association, including electing officers and enacting items of new business, a budget, and a comprehensive body of resolutions.

Elected officers include a president, a president-elect, a past president, and a recording secretary. A thirty-nine member Board of Directors meets nine times a year to put into effect the policies and directions of the Representative Assembly and to consider recommendations of fourteen standing committees.

Meetings of the Board, its own committees, and fourteen membership committees bring about some 2,400 trips each year to our Garfield Heights conference center from all over northeastern Ohio. The conference center is staffed full-time by Executive Director Bill Lavezzi and Executive Assistant Linda Grunden.

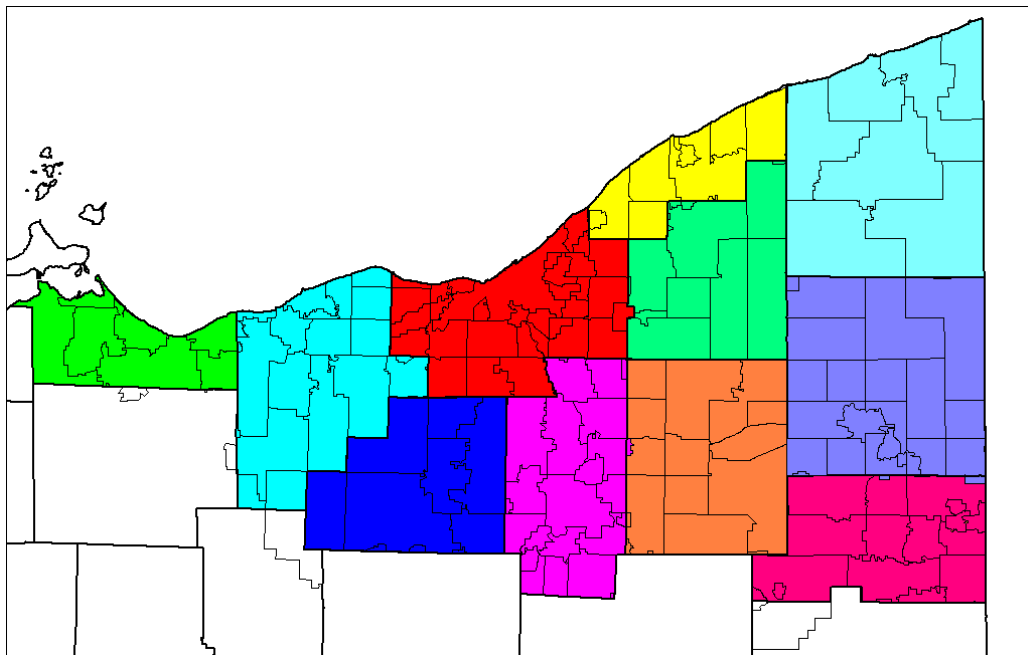
